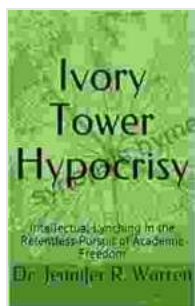

The Urgent Need to Safeguard Academic Freedom

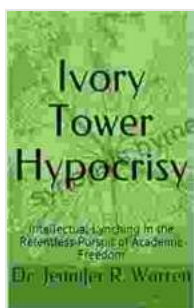
